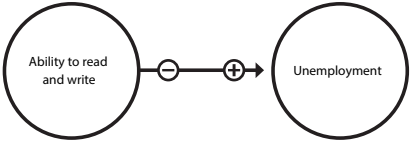
This map shows the complex dynamics of working with a person with disability in the criminal justice system in Victoria.

In this map, ‘person’ or ‘person with a disability’ is used to refer to people who, because of their disability, illness or impairment, are at risk of becoming entrenched in cycles of disadvantage by a criminal justice system that does not adequately support them or respect their rights. We acknowledge that people with cognitive or neurological disability and people experiencing mental ill-health or distress are particularly at risk.

How to read this map
This map shows causal relationships in the current system; it doesn't show steps in a process.

The large circles on the map represent factors in the system. Factors, such as ‘ability to read and write’ or ‘unemployment’, have influence over other factors. This influence is shown by the arrows.

The ⊕ and ⊖ symbols should be read as ‘more (likelihood) of factor’ and ‘less (likelihood) of factor’, respectively. For example:



This should be read as “less ability to read and write leads to more likelihood of unemployment.”
